Meetoo: A system to support in-class real time responses from students

Meetoo is a technology that facilitates polling or the raising of questions via mobile devices in training, meetings, classes and conferences. This is a very flexible, easy to use system that could be used in a wide variety of ways.

There are two basic functions, running a poll, and allowing others to respond to a given topic. These can be created and delivered via the web or a powerpoint slide, and the audience can respond via any web enabled device, e.g. phone, tablet, or laptop.

Powerpoint: Considering the impact of Powerpoint presentations on the student learning experience at LJMU

There are wide ranging examples of practice with respect to PowerPoint use as a teaching aid at LJMU. There are also equally varied perspectives on acceptable practice, that must be considered from the perspective of teacher and learner, the content of the subject discipline and the overall design philosophy of a taught session. Powerpoint slides may be one of the only tangible learning resources that a student receives in conjunction with a lecture. This considered, it is possible that students use their own evaluations of PowerPoint slides as an indicator of their overall taught learning experience at LJMU. It may, therefore, be important to manage student expectations regarding the role, use and purpose of PowerPoint to their learning.

Panopto

Panopto is LJMU's institutional video recording and management system, that greatly simplifies the process of media creation and sharing through an easy to use set of tools and secure integration into Canvas course spaces. Panopto is already winning the praise of LJMU staff and students through a number of applications including sharing of short video messages by tutors, recorded lab demonstrations, narrated PowerPoints, live broadcasts, student presentations and video assignments. As a tool it is allowing staff to better support diverse student needs and rethink how programmes are delivered such as 'flipped' teaching, with comprehensive usage analytics for evaluation of techniques. It can further engage the learner through built-in quizzing, captioning and group notetaking. This session will showcase a number of applications, with case studies from across LJMU, and give attendees the chance to try out using Panopto within their own courses.

Assessing Groupwork

Group work is an essential part of many degree programmes. It encourages and fosters communication and social skills in addition to developing team working and leadership qualities. A number of Professional Bodies also stipulate that group working is a required component of accredited courses. But group work often brings debate: students perceive a devaluing of their mark if team members don't 'pull their weight' and the team performs less than optimally (more critically at final year level); staff often struggle to ensure that work is equitable and that all students demonstrate learning across all the learning outcomes. In this session we'll explore the issues around learning and assessment of group work and look at some tools and techniques to make the process manageable and equitable.

Wednesday 31st October - When feedback is forgotten

Dr Robert A. Nash, Senior Lecturer in Psychology at Aston University

Students frequently receive feedback on how well they have achieved in the past, and how to improve in future. But how much of this feedback do students actually remember afterwards? In the first part of this seminar, I will describe an ongoing research programme that explores how and when people remember assessment feedback. Through a series of controlled experiments, our work has uncovered two robust cognitive biases that influence how and whether feedback is remembered. Pinpointing why these memory biases occur, though, has proven surprisingly difficult. In the second part of this seminar, I will situate our experimental findings within the context of our broader research on how, when, and why students engage proactively with the feedback they receive. I will propose where our collective efforts might best be placed, if we wish to strive for our feedback to have greater impact.

Robert Nash is a Senior Lecturer in Psychology at Aston University, and a Senior Fellow of the Higher Education Academy. He studied Psychology at the University of Warwick, where he completed both his undergraduate degree and his PhD. Since then he has held positions at Lancaster University and the University of Surrey, before joining Aston in 2015. He is an experimental psychologist, and his main research specialism is in human memory, with focuses on biases and distortions of memory, and applications to the legal system and to education. He is an editorial board member of the scientific journal 'Psychology, Crime & Law', a governing board member of the 'Society for Applied Research in Memory and Cognition', and recently published an edited book on 'False and Distorted Memories'. Since 2013 he has been pursuing a parallel line of research on the topic of feedback in education: in particular, the issue of students' engagement with the feedback they receive. Previously funded by the Higher Education Academy, this research programme is currently funded by the Leverhulme Trust, where Rob is combining his interest in feedback with his background in memory research, by investigating students' memory for feedback.

Active Learning

Active learning focuses on teaching methods and approaches that encourage students to take an active, engaged part in the learning process. This is in contrast to more traditional methods of teaching such as a lecturer trying to 'transmit' knowledge to students as they sit and listen. Through the structuring of meaningful activities students are placed in charge of their learning by thinking how to apply their learning. The VARK learning styles questionnaire will be completed. Inclusive Curriculum Design

The notion of an inclusive curriculum is based on a simple principle: that education should reflect a diverse society, promote engagement and facilitate the success of all students. regardless of their educational, dispositional, circumstantial or cultural background. As such, the inclusive curriculum goes beyond notions of adjusting existing curricula and educational practices to respond to different needs. Instead, it looks to creating the curriculum as a 'space' where all learners feel included from the outset. This does not just focus on what educators design and deliver, but understands the impact of the 'hidden curriculum' on student learning. In other words, how curriculum operation is influenced by unspoken assumptions about how students should act and react. This session will explore the key features of the inclusive curriculum and consider mechanisms through which the inclusive potential of the curriculum can be realised.

Employability within the Curriculum

With the forever changing landscape of Higher Education. Universities are increasingly being required to focus on issues of employability with employers stating that a 'degree is not enough'. In the 2012 QAA Report it was reported that university education should try to engage students with recognising their employability beyond the university experience. Technology enhanced learning support for programme leaders and their teams

Programme Leaders are invited to consult with the Teaching and Learning Academy to design a Technology Enhanced Learning Development workshop for themselves and their team. This training will take into account your requirements as a team and TEL team will meet with you beforehand in order to:

- Establish which features of Canvas or other learning technologies your team are currently using most frequently;
- Discuss any additional features or tools that you might find helpful to enhance your teaching and learning;
- Evaluate how students are engaging with your courses and look at how this might guide approaches to Canvas course design;
- Discuss any features specific to your programme which may benefit from specific TEL training (for example strategies for managing larger student cohorts using Canvas)
- Look at any hardware that might complement TEL delivery in your programme (webcams for lecture capture or webinars for example) and provide advice as to how you might go about sourcing appropriate equipment.

Once we have collaboratively designed the nature of the sessions, we will schedule a time for yourself and your team and deliver a workshop to best suit your availability (usually over half a day)

The Academy will follow up subsequent to the workshops to evaluate the sessions delivered and discuss any follow up activities. If the Academy have provided equipment we will also plan how to evaluate use of the equipment and the impact of use on TEL delivery.

Validation Training for Chairs, Panel Members (Collaborative and Internal)

Academic members of staff are sought to act as representatives on validation and periodic programme review panels. Face-to-face events are now used as the mechanism for all validation and periodic programme reviews. As a result, a large pool of academic staff are needed to volunteer to act as Chairs and University Representatives. Would you be willing to volunteer and help to support your colleagues in the development of their new and existing programmes?

Validation/review events provide excellent staff development opportunities; a chance to meet staff from across the University and partner institutions and to discuss proposals and share best practice. Volunteers might also want to gain a greater understanding of the approval process for both internal and collaborative programmes.

All academic staff are eligible for the role of University Representative. For the role of Chair, staff should hold a senior academic position and in respect of collaborative events, to have prior experience of collaborative validation events and collaborative programmes. We can provide opportunities to shadow events in order to support further development.
